COURSE DESCRIPTION

Per the Florida Department of Education, the course description is as follows: Students are introduced to the rigor and routine of the art production process including: planning, producing, and reflecting on art. With an emphasis on studio arts, students explore a wide range of 2D and 3D media, skills and techniques, as related to contemporary and historical art perspectives. Projects may include but not be limited to: drawing, painting, printmaking, collage, mixed media, pottery, and sculpture. Students develop technical skills, foster their expressive abilities and employ the use of the elements of art throughout the production process.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Course Objectives

After completing the course, students will be able to:

- **explain** the differences between 2D and 3D art.
- exhibit effective use of skills and techniques related to contemporary and historical art.
- **demonstrate** various art making procedures and routines.
- **implement** planning, producing, and reflecting on art.
- apply various technical skills to foster their expressive abilities.
- **employ** the use of the elements of art throughout the production process.

Module 1 Objectives

The learners will be able to:

- create an individually and independently created piece of art using watercolor.
 - Objective 1 (VA.68.S.2.2): Students will create a successful watercolor painting using the required sequential steps.
- explain the procedures needed to plan and create a work of art using watercolor paints.
 - o **Objective 2 (VA.68.S.1.4)** Students will write an artist statement on the creation methods used with appropriate vocabulary.
- describe various tools, techniques, and best practices to complete their watercolor painting.
 - Object 3 (VA.68.S.3.1): Students will state, within a written reflection, the
 appropriate use of materials and tools they utilized within the process of creating
 their watercolor painting.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Student Expectations: Students are expected to check Canvas daily for announcements or updated information. This course is asynchronous, so we do not have formal meeting times. It is online only but will require work to be completed by specific dates. Students can work ahead but must be sure to turn work in on time. Students will be asked to complete an acknowledgment quiz before any modules are released. This ensures students have read the syllabus, student handbook, and Marion County Public School code of conduct.

Extra Credit: Extra credit is available periodically but can only be used to boost an existing assignment grade. It does not replace a "0" or missing assignment.

Late Assignment Policy: Late assignments are accepted based on Marion County Public Schools policy. If the student has an excused 'absence' for medical reasons, an extension on work will be granted with appropriate documentation provided to the school.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

Attendance/Participation: While attendance is not taken, participation in the course is mandatory and will be based on all assignments being submitted, completed, and on time.

Studying and Preparation Time: Be sure to spend between the equivalent of 47 minutes a day, 4 hours a week, on studying and assignments. This is equivalent to physically being in class daily.

How to Submit Assignments: Assignments are due as described in the assignments section of Canvas, as well as within the assignment description. After the acknowledgment quiz is complete, each subsequent module will become available as the previous module's work is completed. This is to prevent jumping around in the course; each module builds on the last, so jumping around would cause confusion and misunderstanding of later work.

- Artwork is to be photographed as described in each assignment. This includes the progression of each step as well as the final product.
- Assignments are to be submitted through their respective modules within Canvas; email submission is not acceptable. If there is a technical issue, students must contact me immediately and provide screenshots of the error.
- Once the deadline has passed, there are no extensions unless documented as listed per Marion County Public Schools.
- Each assignment needs to be clearly labeled with the student's name (first and last), period number, and assignment name. (i.e., JohnSmithPeriod1Watercolor)
- All tests are given in Canvas and are only open for a predetermined length of time as listed in the module.

THE ONLINE CLASSROOM

Announcements: Announcements will be viewable on the main course screen when logged into your Canvas classroom.

Content: Course content is available through the modules tab on the left side of the course within Canvas. All module names and assignment due dates are available immediately, but content is not accessible until the previous module is completed. The first module is released after the acknowledgment quiz has been passed with a 100%.

Discussions: A discussion board is available for questions and discussion between students. **Course Messages/Email:** Course messages will be the primary means of communication within this course. If you are unable to access your course, you may send an email as an alternative. Please be sure to include the course name in the subject line of the email.

Assignment Submissions: Each assignment will have a description page within the module, giving details of the assignment expectations and requirements. Assignment files will be uploaded via the 'assignment' page. The file type(s) will be listed within the assignment description page, as both typed documents and photos will be required for various stages of the module.

ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS

Week One

Artist Statement: An artist statement is a not-too-long series of sentences that describe what you make and why you make it. It's a stand-in for you, the artist, talking to someone about your work in a way that adds to their experience of viewing that work. Write at least 5 sentences for your artist statement. Be sure to use correct capitalization and spelling.

Practice: Photos of practice and beginning stages of your watercolor painting are to be uploaded; a minimum of three photos are required.

Week Two

Written Reflection: Describe the appropriate use of materials and tools used during the painting process. Be sure to describe how and why you used each technique. Appropriate use of vocabulary and terminology is required.

Practice: Photos of practice and progress of your watercolor painting are to be uploaded; a minimum of three photos are required. Include a written description of any issues that may have arisen and how you corrected or adjusted for them.

Week Three

Final project: Photos of the completed watercolor painting are to be uploaded; a minimum of three photos are required.
